PLAZA NEWSLETTER (November 2023)

When I went to Aso via Kikuchi the other day, I saw beautiful Japanese silver grass and cosmos. The weather suddenly has become more autumn-like. The temperatures in morning and evening have dropped and the sun is setting earlier and earlier, it's dark when I go outside after work. Be careful not to catch a cold as it is the season when you easily get into bad shape.

The Plaza received 64 consultations in September. We share some of them with advice from us. *Some content has been edited so that individuals are not identified.

- Q: I would like to switch from my home country's license to a Japanese one, but I do not speak Japanese. Is it possible to switch my license?
- A:There are several conditions for switching. Your address must be in Kumamoto Prefecture, have a valid foreign driver's license, have stayed in the country where you got your license for a total of at least 3 months after getting your license. Even if you meet the requirements, you may not be able to switch depending on the results of document screening, etc. In addition, the exam is by appointment only, so call first to make an appointment. At that time, you will be briefed on the procedure, the flow of the test day, and the necessary documents. (Phone number: Driver's License Examination Section 096-233-0116) If you have difficulty with Japanese language, have someone who speaks Japanese when you call and go to exam. If you are a TSMC-related person and want to switch licenses, please check with the company first.
- Q: My child is enrolled in an international school. Can I have my child learn Japanese at Orugatta Station (Japanese language classes for children with foreign roots)?
- A: Orugatta Station's activities include follow-up for students who are receiving Japanese language support at public schools. We also provide Japanese language support for textbooks and other materials taught at the schools. Textbooks used in international schools are different, and Orugatta Station's not for purely teaching Japanese in the first place.
- Q: I am an international student. I am planning to buy a plane ticket to go home temporarily next year. However, I cannot pay in cash because the airline does not have an office in Japan, and when I purchase on the web, I have to pay by credit/debit card. I want to get a credit card, but all my applications have been turned down.
- A: You could ask the airline to issue an invoice and see if you can transfer the money from your current bank? Since you have a bank account, you could apply for a debit card? You could also ask your school teachers and friends, or family and friends in your home country who can pay the bill on your behalf? I
